At the Cross installation on April 30, at Popular Methodist Church Cemetery, there were two brothers buried there; 1. James Thomas Booth, Co B. Manigault Battalion, and 2. Lewis Scarborough Booth, Co. B. Manigault Battalion, S C Artillery. A third brother Nelson Julius Booth, buried at Bakers Chapel Baptist Church, Co. B, Seventh Battalion Reserves. They had three sisters who were married to Confederate Soldiers, 1. Marry Ann Booth Cartrette, was married to Howell Cartrette Co. B. Manigault Battalion, 2. Samantha Booth Cartrette, was married to John Pettiway Cartrette, Wards Company, Waccamaw Light Artillery, 3. Martha Urilla Booth Mishoe was married to Jeremiah Mishoe, Co. F. Seventh South Carolina Cavalry Regiment, and they are buried at Cool Springs Methodist Church Cemetery. Kenneth Parker Booth was born in 1850 and too young for military service. They had a brother who died during the War John Asbury Booth, Co. B. Tenth S.C. Inf, died June 6, 1863 from Typhoid Fever at 22 years old. They were the children of John James Booth and
